7.1.2 – Environmental Consciousness and Sustainability/Alternate Energy initiatives such as:

Percentage of power requirement of the University met by the renewable energy sources

The university organized several activities for the purpose of Environment conciousness. Some of these are: • The Department of Environmental and Life Sciences conducts research on various topics related to Environmental Conservation to further promote environmental consciousness among community at large through publications, paper presentations, Guest lectures etc. • The University harnesses the available potential for generating solar power by using unutilized space at its roof- top to promote green and clean power by installing a 75 KWp Grid interactive SPV power plant to reduce the dependence on conventional energy sources. • The IIS University has a green campus which has been further enhanced by declaring the campus a "No Tobacco Zone". • In its initiative to save energy the University has started replacing the conventional tube lights with LED tube lights in a phased manner. • Staff and students are encouraged to switch off the electrical appliances when they are not in use. • The University encourages the campus community to use University buses for transportation, thus saving fuel and reduce the carbon emissions. • Staff as well as the students are encouraged to organize car pools for commuting. • The residual water from the RO systems is used to water the University lawns. • The water from the air conditioners' and distillation unit outlets is collected in a tank and is used for laboratory purposes. • Tree plantation drives are undertaken time to time in the University campus and surrounding areas to sensitize the students about the benefits of planting trees. • The water quality of bore well water and water cooler at the campus is regularly monitored for various quality parameters including pH, electrical conductivity, total hardness, fluorides, nitrates and inorganic phosphates as well as microbiological parameters. At the University campus, the ambient and indoor air quality is regularly monitored. The Department of Environmental Science is actively involved in monitoring the indoor air quality with respect to respirable particulate matter, suspended particulate matter, SO2 and NO2 using a dust sampler.

Besides the regular courses of study on offer, the University makes available a wide range of application based subjects. It has also taken a lead in introducing vocational and job oriented courses designed courses oriented to develop the much needed competencies which would help the students to keep pace with the times. As a deemed to be University it had freedom to establish courses of study and research and to provide instruction in such branches of study as it may deem appropriate for the advancement of learning and dissemination of knowledge.
